The mission of the center is to partner with the community by providing safe refuge and comprehensive services responsive to the individual needs of women, children and men experiencing domestic violence, sexual assault or child abuse in Bastrop, Colorado, Fayette and Lee counties

FY 2005 TEAM HIGHLIGHTS

Community Outreach Team

Provides community education and outreach on domestic violence, sexual assault and child abuse to adults and children in the four county area

- 446 prevention (anti-violence anti-victimization) presentations were given in grades K-12th.
- 5,573 elementary students received presentations
- 3,366 middle/high school students received presentations.
- 52 domestic violence, sexual assault, and child abuse presentations were given to 1,368 individuals in the community

Shelter & Housing Team

Provides emergency shelter, long term housing and comprehensive continuum of services to victims of abuse.

- 6,919 nights of shelter to 152 adults and 175 children.
- 43 individuals received supportive housing.

Counseling Team

Provides art and play therapy to adults and children to reduce trauma from sexual assault, domestic violence and child abuse.

- 260 children received art/play therapy.
- 140 adults & teens received counseling to continue healing.
- Raised awareness and funds through client art at Annual Festival of Trees Fundraiser.
- Expanded teen anger management to 12 sessions & increased parental involvement.

Crisis Intervention Team

Provides crisis intervention services in four counties 24 hours a day 7 days a week.

- 6,760 hotline calls were answered.
- 2,656 adults and children received crisis intervention services.
- 169 individuals were assisted in the protective order process.
- 433 non-issue walk-ins received services.

Adult Violence Intervention

Provides educational groups designed to help individuals end their violence to their loved ones and others in the community.

- There were 136 new intakes 87 adults graduated.
- 56 adults participated in the Protective Parenting group.
- 575 domestic violence incidents were reported to the FVIS system by law enforcement.

Our Volunteers

Volunteers worked to help create a safe community for their friends and neighbors.

- An average of 68 volunteers a month provided 14,425 hours of volunteering.
- 333 children received school supplies and 144 families received holiday gifts and food.
